Kestrels and Their Importance

The American Kestrel

Small bird of prey from the Falcon family

Natural Pest Control

Kestrels feed on unwanted rodents and pests, helping to keep insect population in balance. This not only helps alleviate problems in a suburb like ours, but also in farms with pest problems.

Threats to Kestrels

Habitat Loss

Urbanization, Deforestation, and Agricultural Expansion all contribute to decreasing the natural habitat, which kestrels thrive in.

The main reason of kestrel population decline is due to deforestation.

Pesticides and Climate Change

Pesticide use contaminates the food chain, eventually starving kestrels by eliminating their food supply.

Changing weather patterns negatively impact migration routes and food availability.

Pesticide Control

As we know kestrels are a great natural pest control, but they also suffer from the use of pesticides in their ecosystem.

Nesting Box Construction

Nesting boxes are a great way to support kestrel repopulation from their dwindling numbers, due to habitat loss.

Houston, Texas



- In September of 2019 Houston declared their city bird.
- Houston is a central flyway for migratory birds. To raise awareness they conducted a campaign where their residents voted for a city bird.
- Houston not only uses the Yellow-Crowned
 Night-Heron for it's own awareness programs, but also to raise awareness on all the endangered birds in houston.




Long Term Vision
