my own law firm (2001 – 2013) and am managing partner for my current firm's Dallas office (2013 to date) so I understand the pressures on businesses making payrolls, servicing customers/clients and paying taxes. Locally, I have almost 20 years of experience in city governance, and have attended nearly all city council meetings and budget workshops over the past four years. This experience will enable me to immediately contribute toward meeting our city's financial challenges, while maintaining our quality of life and all we have invested in our community.

When and why did you move to Coppell?

In 2008, my family relocated to Coppell due to its exceptional schools. Moreover, we were drawn to its remarkable diversity and how it exudes an elegant atmosphere in comparison to neighboring cities.

Like so many others, we moved to Coppell in 1998 so that our two daughters could attend the schools here. Over the course of the past 24 years, we have also discovered a wonderful community "for a lifetime," as the phrase goes. We look forward to many more years as residents.

What are the biggest issues facing the city?

- Childrens' safety, driven by the drug epidemic and school shootings.
- Raising property taxes, which affects everyone, but especially seniors and neighbors on fixed income.

Overall, our state government continues to usurp municipal authority and to deprive us of the ability to meaningfully engage in local governance. We have already experienced this in HB 2439 which took effect on September 1, 2019 and divested local zoning authority from

- Falling enrollment in our elementary schools, young families are unable to afford a Coppell home.
- \$20+ Million/Year reduction in City revenues, driven by SB 3.334.
- Coppell's restaurants and entertainment business are struggling meanwhile Coppell residents are spending our entertainment dollars in neighboring cities.

Coppell and other cities over the use of specific building materials in commercial and residential development.

This same tendency toward usurpation of local control is once again threatening our city on the issue of short term rentals. After considering several bills in 2019 that would have created a statewide preemption of local governments from regulating short-term rental properties, the Legislature is back in session and several bills following this lead are proposed. I believe short term rentals threaten the fabric of our sense of community and our fiscal health and should be resisted by every available legal means. We should oppose these bills and any other bills that seek to deprive home rule cities from exercising their right to self-governance. Our representatives in Austin should follow the dictum that "the best government is that which allows us to govern ourselves." Johann Wolfgang Von Goethe

Next, we need to remain vigilant on the fiscal front as we continue to adapt to 34 Texas Administrative Code, Section 3.334, and the dramatic change it has brought to our sales tax collections. The good news is that our Council and City Manager have

already reduced our expenditures to accommodate this abrupt change in sales tax collection that was unilaterally imposed by regulatory fiat out of the State Comptroller's office on January 3, 2020. Our law suit against Comptroller Hagar's office is set for trial in November 2023, and this will hopefully finally conclude so we may gain greater clarity about our future in sales tax collection.

Now that we are returning to relatively normal post-pandemic economic activity at all levels, we will have to carefully monitor our sales tax collections in relation to our inflating costs. Beginning in roughly 1990 and continuing forward through 2000 to date, our Councils and City Managers encouraged the development of light industrial commercial warehouses on our city's west side. This effort capitalized on our proximity to DFW Airport, made us more competitive in securing corporate warehousing relocations, and significantly diversified our city's tax base away from residential property taxes.

In the interest of enhancing our property and sales tax revenue, while lessening our reliance on residential property taxes, our city staff have recently started the process of working with industrial developers and our current industrial businesses

and property owners in our commercial/warehouse district to identify and, in turn, exploit trends such as larger warehouse sizes and the use of automated robotics systems to ensure we remain highly competitive in the light industrial commercial sector. As we strive to get ahead of the emerging trends in this important commercial warehousing space, I believe it is critically important for us to remain relevant in attracting and redeveloping our west side to ensure the continued diversification of our tax base and a strong revenue source from the commercial district of our city. We should also keep Section 3.334 in mind when targeting different businesses for recruitment to our west side and attempt to determine the volume of sales taxes their presence in Coppell will generate in relation to other relocation candidates. In this way, we can attempt to secure as much tax revenue from purchases the business makes that renders Coppell the "destination" of all such goods and purchases, and the recipient of all such related sales tax revenue under the new regime.

Finally, I believe we need to reinvigorate Old Town to attract more restaurants and retail/office development that will further

complement our thriving Farmer's Market. We have a pad site immediately east of Twisted Root Burgers that is dedicated to development of a restaurant and we have yet to attract such a restaurant to the area. This is a sure sign that we need to "kick start" our efforts in Old Town. We need to undertake a course of action to encourage further development of the area to create more foot traffic and a greater dynamic that will support our small businesses already there and better enable us to recruit and attract new small businesses that will better serve our residents and attract others to our community. Consistent with my proposal regarding recruiting businesses to our west side of town, sales tax and commercial property tax generated locally in Old Town will remain in Coppell and afford an important source of fiscal relief to our residential tax payers.

Why should voters choose you over your opponent?

Fellow Coppell residents that know me, have described me as a listener, collaborator, problem solver, and uniter, qualities that I believe are essential for effective leadership. When and why did you move to Coppell ISD?

We choose to move to Coppell in 2007. We made our first offer in October of 2007. We struggled to sell our old house from 2008-20013; Silver lining in not landing that first house. Finally, December 2013 we sold our old house. And in March of 2014, we bought our Coppell house did a quick renovation and moved in May. We choose CISD for the same reason that nearly everyone moved here for: the exceptional school district and wonderful community. I want to do my part to make sure that we maintain it and are able to pass it on to the next folks that will also come for the same reasons.

I moved to Coppell in 2021 after having lived in Valley Ranch for 5 years and having grown up in Grapevine. Like most people in Coppell, we moved here for the schools. If elected I will work to ensure that families continue saying that for years to come.

Our family moved to Coppell ISD in 2009 because of the reviews we got about the quality of education and overall quality of life.

What are the biggest issues facing the school district?

Teacher retention and attracting high level teachers is paramount in our District's ability to provide the best education. The easy answer may seem to be higher pay. Unfortunately it's not that simple. Although CISD pay is highly competitive, there are other Districts that do pay more. But our teachers are not running to those Districts. And those Districts have difficulties in attracting teachers. Why? None of those other Districts have what we have: our community. We have a community that supports our teachers better than anyone. It is this positive environment that motivates our teachers to stay here. We need to continue to foster an environment where our teachers get the support they need from our community; maintaining

The three biggest issues for CISD are navigating state constraints to provide for our teachers, planning for flat or declining enrollment, and fiscal transparency. Here's how I plan to address each:

Navigating state constraints to provide for our teachers - so much of what we do in Coppell ISD starts with decisions made in Austin. So first and foremost, I will continue to advocate for Coppell ISD with our state legislators. But regardless of the decisions those legislators make, we must continue doing everything we can to compensate our teachers as highly as our budget allows. But given our financial constraints, we must also work to provide attractive benefits and nonmonetary perks too. We

relationships with the Chamber of Commerce; partnering with the **Education Foundation** and PTO's. We need to continue to explore more ways we can support and celebrate our amazing teachers. We need to also engage our teachers in open dialog to better understand what else makes them choose to stay in our District. We also need to understand what temps them to consider leaving; what do they value and how can we help meet that need. We need to hear from their peers in other Districts and understand why they stay there. Teachers are the foundation of our education. If we invest in our teachers; we invest in our kids.

can do that by providing leadership opportunities, professional development training, and trying to help solve work-life balance challenges. Our culture is important too.

Flat or declining enrollment - Due to rising home prices, the demographics of Coppell are shifting. Fewer families with young children are moving to the area, which the district projects will soon cause flat or declining enrollment numbers. As a result of these projected changes, the district's considering various options, including opening enrollment in Coppell ISD to neighboring areas or potentially closing one of the district's elementary schools. Between these options, if the projections of declining enrollment come to fruition, I'd favor limited open

enrollment to neighboring communities because it would allow the district to receive additional tax money from each family that chooses to send their children to Coppell ISD. But regardless, I believe decisions of this magnitude require community input. They're too important to be made by seven people, particularly when so many of our current trustees no longer have children in the district. So one of my first actions as a trustee would be to request the creation of a visioning committee for our district's elementary schools so that the entire Coppell ISD community can be involved in whatever decisions we must make as a result of potential changes in our enrollment numbers.

Fiscal transparency – In communications to the community, Coppell ISD frequently laments its

"budget deficit" and even incorrectly tells the community things like, "we cannot continue to spend more than our revenue." But the district has never spent more than it has received. Despite projecting a deficit in eight out of the past ten years, every year Coppell ISD has ultimately received more money than it spent. So I also intend to increase the district's financial transparency so that our community is well-informed and can weigh in on the issues facing the district.

Why should voters choose you over your opponent(s)?

One thing I will say, we are blessed to have an amazing group of candidates to choose from. CISD will be in good hands no matter who you choose. Unlike my opponents, I have served our entire community: through the Chamber of Commerce; in District level

What do you do for a living, and what does your spouse do?

I am a CERTIFIED FINANCIAL PLANNER™ professional and founder of Caviness Wealth Management, LLC. I provide comprehensive wealth management to individuals and families.

When and why did you move to Coppell ISD?

Jessica and I moved to Coppell when we married in 2005 so that when we started our family, our kids would attend school in Coppell ISD. We've After we married in 2005, we moved to Valley Ranch, and my husband worked for Exxon. Even though we didn't have kids, we quickly learned about the reputation of Coppell ISD

now been parents in the district for the past 11 years. schools. Exxon then moved us to Houston, where we lived for over ten years, then to Dubai for two years, and lastly to Coppell. We moved to Coppell amid Covid during the summer of 2020. Exxon had moved my husband from overseas to Las Colinas. We knew immediately we wanted to live in Coppell. Coppell ISD is our forever home. My husband left his career at Exxon so that we could remain in here. We will be in Coppell schools for the next 14 years.

What are the biggest issues facing the school district?

There is a significant shortage of teachers nationwide, and attracting and retaining high-quality teachers has become a major challenge.
Compounding this issue is the additional workload teachers bear as we work to recover from the pandemic and close the gaps due to learning loss. Working through those challenges requires extra time and resources, forcing the district to do more with less, as state funding has yet to keep pace with inflation.

First, funding is a significant issue that the district is facing. 26% of CISD's budget goes to recapture, also known as Robin Hood. This year more than \$46 million of Coppell's taxpayer funds were sent to the state and went into the state's general fund. We need to keep more of our money in our district. Due to projected budget deficits, cuts have been made that negatively impact our teachers and learners.

We must focus our efforts on the state legislature to address the funding. We need massive community involvement if we want changes regarding the financing of public schools. As a nonprofit leader, I have mobilized thousands of people and gotten them to engage with their elected officials, which led to changes

in public policy. I can bring these same skills to the area of school funding, a place where the community must rally and join forces to make a difference. No one on the board has this depth of advocacy experience, which is needed.

Second, we are facing a significant teacher shortage in Coppell and statewide. To understand why, I have spent over 40 hours interviewing 25 teachers who recently left CISD or are still currently teaching. The reasons why they are going vary from being overworked, not enough pay, changes brought on due to COVID, and lack of maternity leave, amongst other things. Also, to prepare for serving on the school board, I began to substitute teach at the elementary, middle, and high schools. I want firsthand knowledge of what our teachers and learners experience daily.

Here are some changes that I would like to see implemented to retain our teachers:

- Learn from nearby districts that have subsidized daycare for teachers.
- Fight for higher teacher pay at the state legislative level.
- Encourage willing parent and community volunteers to give teachers extra planning time during recess and lunch.

- Better support principals who are doing everything they can for their teachers.
- Create a culture where teachers and all staff feel safe voicing their opinions.

Why should voters choose you over your opponent?

My 18-year history of involvement within our schools and community has provided me with the experience and knowledge necessary to understand the complex issues facing Coppell ISD and the insight to navigate an ever-changing landscape.

Being a Parent, spouse to an educator, and a business owner, have given me a unique perspective serving on the board over the past six years, keeping our students, teachers, and families top of mind.

I have forged a great working relationship with my fellow Trustees, Superintendent, and administrative staff.
